Maundy Money 2023

Vina Strachan from St Ninian's Dundee writes on her experience of receiving the Maundy Money this year: "I was honoured and truly thankful for this wonderful gift of receiving the Maundy money from King Charles III.

"As soon as we stepped into York minster there was an amazing buzz and I was excited for the other 147 recipients who like me were excited to meet the King. On our seats were our names, a big print copy of the Order of Service and a special little booklet with daily prayer for the Coronation of King Charles III.

"The splendour of the music, from the choir of York minster and HM Chapel Royal, the procession of the Archbishop of York and clergy, The ecumenical Procession, The Royal procession and the Royal Almonry procession with the Yeoman of the Guard carrying the alms to the singing of Praise to the Holiest in the height was a wonderful spectacle of colour from the flower arrangements, the robes and the sun glinting through the stained glass windows.

"The service derives its name from the Latin word Mandatum meaning a commandment, and its opening words are: Jesus said: "A new commandment I give unto you.. . " The symbol of humility came as the Rt Rev Dr John Inge removed his cope and the children bearing flowers had the towels worn in the style of a deacon. The distribution of the Alms was very special as King Charles moved down the lines of recipients to the music of the choirs. The red purse contains a nominal allowance for clothing and provisions, a specially minted commemorative coin with King Charles' head and a 70 on it and the other a 5. The white purse contained silver coins making up 75p, the sovereign's age in years. King Charles, standing in front of me, presented me with the 2 purses containing the Alms, took both of my

hands in his hands and looked directly at me thanking me for the work I had done and left me with a blessing. I remembered to curtsy and thank his Majesty.

"After the service and the King and Queen Consort had left the Minster we were allowed to take photos before emerging out to the sunshine and the cheering crowds. It was a wonderful occasion for me, for the family and friends who were able to join me and very special for the church and my community. Thank you to my best friend from school who lives in York and provided a lovely, themed dinner to celebrate the occasion and also to the person who nominated me."

Tay Copes Project

Copes are worn in church services for festivals, diocesan gatherings and great occasions. The **Tay Copes Project** is the creation of a set of Chapter Copes for the Cathedral and Diocese of Brechin. Specially designed for Brechin by the Embroidery Workshop of Derby Cathedral, they are inspired by the Tay, with ornamental hoods each slightly different to reflect the different moods of the river: morning and evening, ebb and flood, winter and summer.

On Sunday 25 June the full set of Copes will be presented and blessed at Evensong in the Cathedral at 5.00 pm. You are invited to come along; or if you aren’t able to, you’ll see the Copes at the installation of a new Dean on Sunday 27 August, and at many diocesan occasions in the future.

Lambeth Conference Phase 3

The Lambeth Conference met in Canterbury in 2022. The Bishops met beforehand (Phase 1) and met in person in England (Phase 2). The theme was to explore what it means to be ‘God’s Church for God’s World’. This was done by the bishops considering ‘Calls’ on key aspects of Anglican church life.

The organisers have now announced that the conference journey now continues as we take forward these “Lambeth Calls” and outcomes of the conference into the life of the Anglican Communion.
