Bishop Forbes Evensong 2021: 10th October—6.15pm, St Paul’s Cathedral Dundee

The Most Reverend Mark Strange, the Primus of the Scottish Episcopal Church, is the preacher at this year’s Diocesan celebration evensong in thanksgiving for Bishop Alexander Penrose Forbes.

Provost Elizabeth Thomson and the congregation of St. Paul’s Cathedral invite all to this Choral Evensong on Sunday 10th October at 6:15pm. Clergy and lay readers are especially asked to attend, and are invited to robe and process as part of the service: choir dress.

The Provost writes, “This year the service will be sung by the Cathedral Choir, so that we can be sure we can follow the guidance and the singers have enough space. Next year, we should be able to arrange for a festival choir for the occasion, drawn from across the Diocese as in the past.

The service will be followed by refreshments. I am very much looking forward to seeing you, especially as it wasn’t possible to invite everyone in person when I was installed as Provost in June. Please pass on the invitation to your churches.”

Bishop Alexander Penrose Forbes founded St Paul’s, now the cathedral in Dundee, and is often regarded as the founder of the modern-day Diocese of Brechin, so this evensong close to the anniversary of his death (8th October) is a ‘Patronal Festival’ for the cathedral and the diocese.

For clergy & lay readers robing: in St Roque’s Hall (accessed inside the cathedral), lower level; choir dress (cassock, surplice, scarf, hood if you like); please be changed and ready by 6pm.

Institution of Jim Benton–Evans as Rector of Brechin and Montrose with Bervie

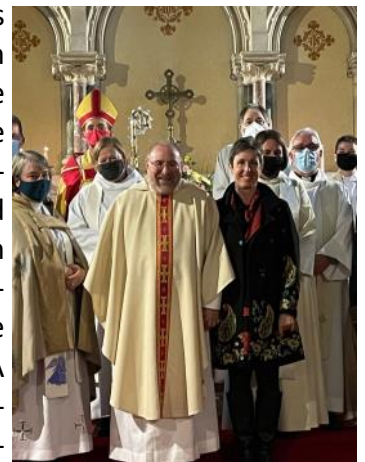
This past weekend saw the beginning of the ministry of the Rev Jim Benton-Evans in the Diocese of Brechin as he was instituted as the Rector of St Mary’s and St Peter’s Montrose with St David of Scotland, Inverbervie and St Andrew’s Brechin. Jim was instituted separately in each of three charges, to reflect the very different contexts and communities that each of the three churches serves.

Jim wondered if this was a record for the number of institutions held to start a ministry?



The first service was Saturday 2nd October, in the morning, in Montrose. Jim was instituted and played ‘With a Little Help From My Friends’ on his ukulele. The congregation and guests, including the Lord Provost of Angus, enjoyed stovies, puddings and chat after the service.

The second service was on Saturday afternoon in Brechin. Jim and Claire were welcomed by the congregation of St Andrew’s and other invited clergy and guests. Canon Lyndsey Downs, the Rector of Banchory (left in the photo) preached again. A reception in the Mechanics Institute in Brechin followed.



The third service was a first in modern times in the Diocese of Brechin: Jim was instituted in a service of welcome on Sunday 3rd October in St David of Scotland in Inverbervie. The congregation and ecumenical guests gathered in the small tin church building in Aberdeenshire to welcome their new priest.

The Bervie congregation had refreshments and home baking following the service.

At each of each service Jim and Bishop Andrew thanked all who had done so much to support the charges through the time of vacancy.

Afghan Refugee Response Update: How can we offer help?

This has left the news cycle but remains very relevant for us all.

A good network has already been established in Dundee to support the previously re-settled Syrian refugee families, supported by a Scottish Refugee Council staff member. They are now looking to gather support for Afghan refugees arriving in the area. The Support Network for Afghans arriving in Scotland has a Google form (link below) to capture offers of help and generates a standard response from the generic mailbox, to put it into a ‘holding’ position until the Scottish Refugee Council knows more about where people will be resettled and their needs.
