

Diocese of Brechin: Lockdown News Bulletin

16th September 2020



Report on Diocesan Council Meeting

Brechin Diocesan Council is the group that manages the day-to-day business of the diocese. The Bishop chairs with the Dean, Diocesan Secretary and Treasurer ex-officio as members. The other eight members (four lay and four ordained) are elected by Diocesan Synod.

Council met, by Zoom, on Wednesday 2nd September, the first official meeting since lockdown. Business has been conducted by email and a 'drop-in' for Council did take place in June.

'New' members of Council, elected at the March Synod, were welcomed and previous minutes reviewed. Mike Duncan, Diocesan Secretary, gave an update on progress with the revised Diocesan constitution. Various decisions made by email in lockdown were also ratified, including the lockdown mothballing of the diocesan centre, underwriting a provincial loan for a charge and the appointment of Elliott Scarfe as the new Bishop's PA.

Mission: the limited activities possible in the 'clusters' in the diocese were discussed. The situation in our companionship diocese of Swaziland (eSwatini) and support we have been to able to provide was presented by Canon Pat Millar.

Ministry: the COVID-19 response in the charges of the diocese was reviewed and the various vacancies/ministries that have ended and started were also presented. The sudden death of Lay Reader Carole Spink was noted. The status of 'transitional' ministries in the diocese was discussed.

A financial overview was presented by Allan Duffus, the Treasurer. Savings have been made in many areas of diocesan expense in lockdown. Charges have been reporting if they have had any cashflow issues with the pandemic: to date no major issues have arisen in the diocese as the situation continues.

Finally, the bishop reported that St Margaret's Nursing Home in Dundee, part of the diocese, has managed to avoid any cases of COVID-19 in the pandemic. Carole Spink had acted as chaplain to the home: new arrangements would be needed.

The meeting closed in prayer.



Spotlight on 'Tay Cluster': All Souls, Invergowrie Reopens for Communal Worship

Sunday 30th August was a significant day for All Souls'. Not only was it the first service in the church building since March, but also Rev David Gordon's first service as Priest-in-Charge. It was good to be back worshipping with others. As one of the group who worked out the precautions required to keep everyone safe the new set up was already familiar to me. The congregation received a note detailing what



to expect the week before and my perception was that everyone took things in their stride. By this time most people are used to wearing a face mask and sanitising regularly as a matter of course. Having movable seats meant it was easier to set out the seating to comply with social distancing by removing seats rather than cordoning off rows. This gives the impression of fewer restrictions, although there are fewer seats to choose from. The feedback from those attending was positive, both about being back in the building and the new Priest-in-Charge.

It was also a humbling experience leading my first Service in All Souls since becoming Priest-in-Charge. While it has been very good to connect with one another via Zoom and telephone calls, there is no substitute for being together at the Lord's Table in the church of which we are members.
